In partnership with Health Science Librarians at Stony Brook University, the following three training workshops are being scheduled at SCLS to provide instruction on consumer health resources for public librarians in Suffolk County and public library school students. Funding for the workshops was awarded through

the Health Information Awareness Award by the National Library of Medicine (NLM), National Institutes of Health (NIH).

What the Health? MedlinePlus & Consumer Health Info: *Thursday, Jan. 25, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.* Are you unsure about where to start when a patron approaches with a health related reference question? This workshop will provide the resources and strategies needed to successfully direct patrons to trusted health information that is freely available online.

Genetics Home Reference & More: *Thursday, February 22, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.* This workshop will provide hands-on instruction in using the National Library of Medicine's Genetics Home Reference database. Information about other reliable sources of consumer-oriented genetic health information will also be covered.

TOXNET: Thursday, March 22, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

TOXNET is a suite of databases from the National Library of Medicine, providing a wide variety of information on toxic substances and environmental health. Learn how to use TOXNET and its sister site ToxTown to find information on potentially hazardous compounds. This workshop will be focused on its application for consumer health inquiries.

Gasparis**, MD, FACS, professor of surgery, is a leader in the Division of Vascular and Endovascular Stony Brook Medicine. In addition, he serves as director of the Stony Brook Center for Vein Care, medical director of the Non-Invasive Vascular Laboratory, medical director of the Bellavie MedSpa, and director of the Phlebology Fellowship.

Dr. Nicholas Sikalas is an assistant Professor of Surgery and the Director of the Limb Preservation Center. His expertise is in arterial and venous surgery, including open and endovascular management of all vascular conditions including lower extremity blockages and limb preservation treatment. One successful program, Bad Art Night, involved cleaning out the craft closet and then challenging patrons to come up with the worst art project possible within forty minutes. She concluded the project by handing out ballots for voting for the worst of the worst. All of the projects were displayed in the library case for the next couple of weeks.

Another example, Green Screen Photos, makes use of the system's green-screen technology (which we can borrow for free!). She took photos of patrons with different backgrounds. This can be done for many things, including Valentine's Day, holiday cards, and headshots for LinkedIn. She then emails the photos to patrons and prints out one for each patron to take home.
