Tempus Fugit for the Reader's Advisor

Over the past twenty years, librarians have developed new concepts about how readers react to what they read. In "Building on a Firm Foundation," (*Reference* å User Services Quarterly, Winter 2008), editor Barry Trott discusses "the ever-changing face of Readers' Advisory." Once fiction reading, and in particular genre fiction, was the model and while these are still important, Trott presents the challenge of expanding them to include what author Michael Chabon has called the "borderlands." Using elements of genre fiction, literary fiction writers expose readers to elements of genres they would not necessarily have tried. For example, Audrey Niffenegger explores the consequences of time travel on a relationship in The Time Traveler's Wife or the postapocalyptic setting in Cormac McCarthy's The Road.

Then there is "chick-lit", "street-lit" or "urban fiction." The readers' advisor must be willing to venture into these less-known areas of the reading world. He asks, "How do you adapt readers' advisory skills to apply to audio book listeners...and not just books, but music and films." Now, just a few years later, we must add "e-books."

In the arena of shrinking library budgets, it is important to quantify the value of Readers' Advisory services and their impact on library circulation. It is acknowledged that readers' advisory encounters are hard to measure. How do we calculate what percentage of circulation comes from book displays? What about creating links from the library catalog to RA resources online which can also be used to quantify how often users access them from the catalog.

The Reader's Advisory Committee is a valuable resource for discussing these issues. We share our experiences, our expertise even as we share our reactions to the books we have read. Join us to share your experience while expanding your skills.
