# SCLS Outreach Services

#### Talking Books for Your Patrons

Within the next few weeks, SCLS Outreach Services will be doing a mailing of Talking Book brochures and applications to all of the public libraries on Long Island. We hope that you will make these materials available to your patrons and co-workers.

#### Overview of the Talking Book Program:

The National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS) a Division of the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., provides library books in Audio and Braille formats for people with visual, learning and physical disabilities. NLS distributes these library materials through a network of Libraries for the Blind around the country. Each state, except for Wyoming, has at least one Regional Library. Many of the states have Sub-Regional Libraries. New York State has two Regional Libraries for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. This network of Libraries distributes books in cassette, digital cartridges, Braille and books in a digital downloadable format. Materials are delivered FREE OF CHARGE TO ELIGIBLE INDIVIDUALS. Registered patrons will also receive a Talking Book machine and any accessories that are needed to make these reading materials accessible, such as a breath switch (that can enable a person to breathe into a device that will turn the machine on and off) or a pillow speaker that can be used by someone who cannot sit up or get out of a bed.

An individual is eligible to receive Talking Books if they are visually impaired, blind, have a physical disability that prevents them from holding a book or turning a page or if a person has a learning disability that prevents them from reading print materials.

Eligible patrons DO NOT HAVE TO BE BLIND. In fact, any of your patrons who use large print books are eligible to register for Talking Books.

Often we hear about the limited number of large print books that are available. Print books are costly to produce. Large print is even more costly. Additionally, large print means different things to different people, so it is difficult to determine what size print will work best for an individual living with vision loss. Many public libraries have audiobooks. These are also available in limited quantities. There are tens of thousands of titles available through the National Library Service. While the four track cassette tape is still available to patrons, they are no longer produced by NLS. The current digital cartridge and digital downloadable formats are crisp and clear. The sound quality is outstanding and the ease of use makes them more desirable than the older cassette formats. The cartridges are delivered FREE OF CHARGE through the United States Postal Service, directly to the patron's home and returned the same way. The digital downloadable format is done through the BARD (Braille and Reading Download) site. The books are downloaded onto a flash drive which can be placed into the Digital Talking Book Machine (that is provided free of charge through the local Library for the Blind).

Long Island patrons receive their Talking Books from the Andrew Heiskell Braille and Talking Book Library, located in New York City. Patrons can call the library toll-free at 1-855-697-6975. Patrons can also browse for and order their own books on the library's website at: <u>http://www.nypl.org/locations/heiskell</u>. Library staff is also welcome to contact The Andrew Heiskell Library.

SCLS Outreach Services works directly with the Andrew Heiskell Library and maintains a connection to the Talking Book database. We have access to patron records and can order books and machines. We are available to library staff and their patrons for any Talking Book related questions. We have applications in the Outreach Services department and would welcome the opportunity to meet with library staff to demonstrate the Talking Book machine and provide information to patrons through library programs. Library staff is welcome to visit the SCLS Outreach Services department to learn more about the Talking Book program and how to promote this library service to your community.

Please feel free to contact the SCLS Outreach Services department to request an updated list of Talking Book patrons in your community.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Librarians are eligible to certify a Talking Book application for a patron who has a visual or physical disability. If you have a patron who is currently using large print materials, if you know of a patron who has difficulty seeing as a result of an eye disease or a health condition or if you know of a patron who has difficulty holding a book or turning a page because of a condition such as arthritis, Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis, or any other health condition that is affecting someone's ability to comfortably read a library book, please assist your patron with filling out the application and then feel free to certify that application.

You will most certainly have patrons in your community who can benefit from and will greatly enjoy the Talking Book program. Many seniors are dealing with eye conditions such as age-related macular degeneration, glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy or cataracts. These and other eye conditions prohibit people from enjoying the ability to read a book. Keep in mind that most people do not """look"""" like they are visually impaired, however, you can easily determine which of your patrons may wish to try this specialized library service. The Talking Books are FREE to use. You can assure your patron that if they do not enjoy listening to the books, that the books and materials can easily be returned and that they can try them again at any time. Often a patron will feel overwhelmed with living with vision loss and trying this new way of reading. It is always good to sit with your patron and review the application so that they can more clearly define what types of books they would like to receive. SCLS Outreach Services is always

available to assist you and your patron with this process.

IMPORTANT NOTE: A librarian CANNOT certify an application for a patron with a learning disability. This must be done by a Medical Doctor or a Doctor of Osteopathy.

Children (and adults) with a physical or learning disability that prevent them from using a traditional print book, are also eligible to receive Talking Books. There are thousands of titles available for readers of all ages. The books are easy to find and cataloged with age and grade related recommendations. The books are in an audio or Braille format and are available on the Andrew Heiskell and National Library Service database. Books are available in various formats, such as a digital cartridge, digital downloadable and hard copy and digital downloadable Braille. Books can be played on the Talking Book machine which is provided FREE of charge through the National Library Service. Commercial playback equipment is also available for purchase through a variety of manufacturers who design playback devices for materials in accessible formats. The National Library Service also offers an app for the iPhone and iPad that will enable your Talking Book patrons to access their reading materials on the i-devices.

Several public libraries have a Talking Book machine and a digital cartridge (book) in the library for demonstration purposes. Please contact SCLS Outreach Services if you would like to have a Talking Book machine in your library. Of course, we will show you how to use the machine and how to access the BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Download) website. This will

enable you to assist your Talking Books patrons with downloading a book.
