YA PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Valentines for Veterans

The teens at the Half Hollow Hills Community Library in Dix Hills created Valentine's for Veterans Jars filled with chocolates and little notes this February! The jars were donated to the Long Island State Veteran's Home at Stonybrook University, which is a 350-bed skilled nursing facility that provides round-the-clock nursing and sub-acute care to veterans of the United States armed forces.



Crocheting for Cats

I'm thrilled to share the success of a new program we tried called "Crocheting for Cats," run by our teen department. This program introduced teens to crocheting, offering three levels of difficulty for crochet patterns, along with pom-pom makers for those who had trouble picking up crocheting. We had two of our awesome librarians teach the teens how to crochet, and a third librarian man the pom-pom station. After making the toys, the teens bagged and labeled them to give them a more professional look. In the same week we hosted a school visit from the Middle School National Junior Honor Society, where we ran the same type of program again, allowing us to expand our efforts and create even more crocheted toys! We had over 50 teens participate in both programs, and together the teens crafted and bagged over 150 toys to be donated to the Islip Animal Shelter for future cat adopters! We were extremely proud of our teens, and the creativity and effort they put forth to volunteer for shelter cats.

YA PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Hygge Lounge

Just yesterday, I decorated our Teen Room around the hygge theme (think cozy and comforting) to draw some teens in. We had a video fireplace playing; I set up an area to grab cookies, tea or hot chocolate; I also set up fairy lights and flameless candles on the tables, and curtain lights over our windows. I also put a display of books that fit the hygge theme, like fairytale or folklore (e.g. Winterwood, This Fatal Kiss, The Language of Thorns, etc.) and put a flyer out describing what hygge means.



Lucky Charms

All we needed to make them was shamrock enamel pins (which came with the bags), cardstock which was designed using Canva, crayons and scissors to complete the craft. The charms were then set out on the Public Service desk and the Circulation Desk for patrons who may have needed an extra piece of luck during the day. Teens received community service when they completed their sets.

Blind Date with a Book

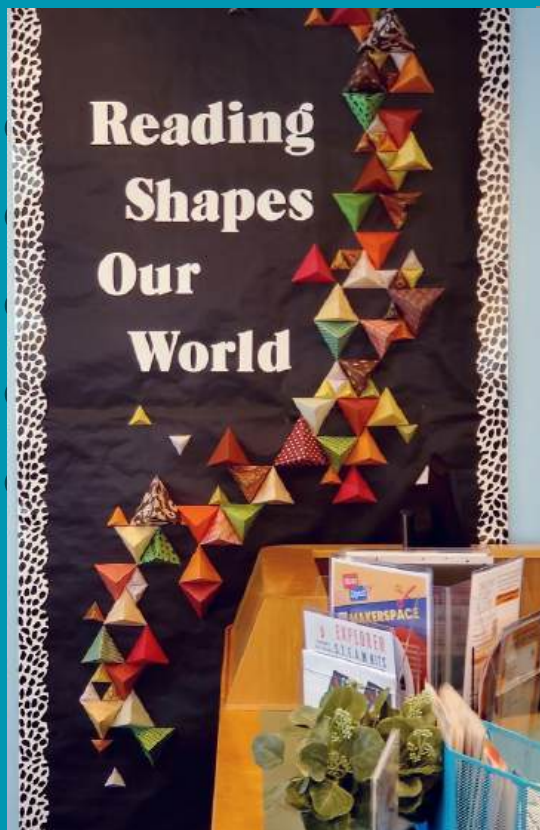

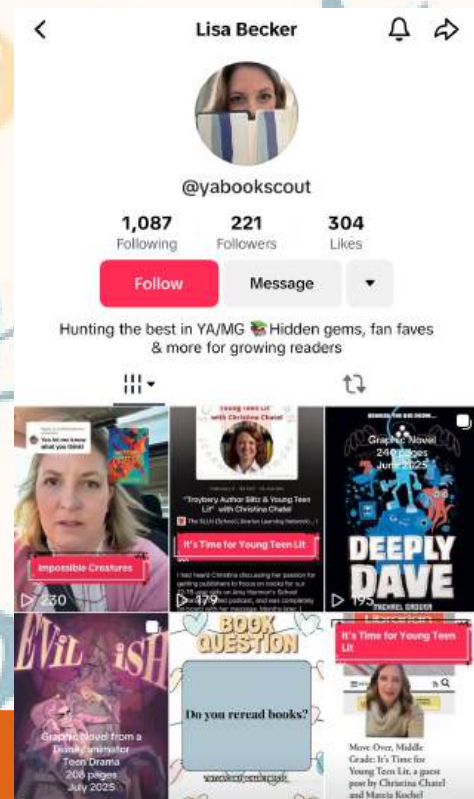
